



About the Project

The School Centered Community Development Program of United Way Delhi envisages that all students achieve their full potential through contextual interventions in early childcare & education, primary and higher education, skillbuilding in the youth, and caregiver & community awareness. The program has three stages namely Born Learning, School Support Program, and Youth Resource Center.

Developmental Milestones of Children of AWC

During the period of 2023-24, the assessment of level of achievement of developmental milestones of the children of AWC highlighted the effectiveness of the interventions in enhancing the developmental milestones of children across the regions.

Delhi

In Delhi, there was a notable improvement in children's developmental milestones. Oral communication skills increased from 30.9% at baseline to 74.4% at endline. Cognitive skills saw a rise from 29.8% to 58.8%, and physical and motor skills improved from 27.4% to 52.7%. Personal and social skills went up from 26.2% to 52.8%, and creativity showed significant growth from 26.4% to 64.3%.


Hyderabad

In Hyderabad, children also demonstrated substantial progress. Oral communication skills increased from 42.9% at baseline to 86.9% at endline. Cognitive skills improved from 42.7% to 69.0%, while physical and motor skills saw a rise from 31.4% to 72.8%. Personal and social skills increased from 26.4% to 42.9%.

Bangalore


The children of Bangalore exhibited marked improvements across all areas. Oral communication skills rose from 50.7% at baseline to 90.8% at endline. Cognitive skills saw a substantial increase from 34.0% to 89.9%. Physical and motor skills improved significantly from 23.2% to 73.9%. Personal and social skills went up from 26.3% to 81.5%, and creativity saw an impressive rise from 8.8% to 41.3%.

Language Learning Outcome of school Children



- In Delhi, the results of learning outcome of Grade 3, 4, and 5 students were evaluated in both baseline and endline assessments.
- In Hyderabad, the learning outcomes of Grade 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 students were compared between baseline and endline assessments.
- In Bangalore, a similar comparison was made for Grade 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 students, examining their progress between baseline and endline assessments.

Life skill status- YRC Bengaluru




Life skill status (Baseline vs Endline)- YRC Bengaluru

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


Shivani Brigbhushan Nishad's Journey of Transformation

Shivani Brigbhushan Nishad's journey from academic struggle to personal empowerment highlights the transformative impact of organizations like CYDA in underserved communities. At 13, Shivani faced academic challenges in science and mathematics while living in the Yerwada slums. Her life changed dramatically after joining CYDA's Youth Resource Centre (YRC) in August 2022. With YRC's tailored support, she improved her academic performance and gained confidence. Beyond academics, Shivani discovered physical and mental strength through YRC's martial arts classes. Her dedication and perseverance in martial arts fostered discipline, focus, and resilience. Under CYDA's guidance, Shivani became an inspiration to her peers, exemplifying the potential for positive change in marginalized communities. Her success underscores the critical role of organizations like CYDA in providing holistic support.



About the Project

The project NEEV recognizes the significance of preschool education based on foundation learning development among children of the 0 - 6 years age group. It is a stage where they are to be introduced to new concepts, learn how to establish social interaction with others and get used to being separated from parents. Addressing the same, NEEV emphasizes on the implementation of high quality Early Childhood Care & Education (ECCE) through strengthening the capacities of Anganwadis/Balwadis in facilitating proper care and fostering an environment intrinsic to quality educational, emotional, physical and psychological growth for the children and all stakeholders involved. The Project, based in Delhi and Pune, Maharashtra, has implemented the upgradation of Balwadi/ Anganwadi centres into child-friendly ECCE centres for the provision of quality learning support to young children (0 – 6 years). Capacity building of Balwadi and Pre-School staffs and parents, especially mothers were also facilitated for delivering proper care in a safe environment in both the schools and homes for the children. Furthermore, multilingual development learning materials such as workbooks were developed, and Building as Learning Aid (BALA) art was incorporated into the entire Balwadis infrastructures to enhance visual learning among the children.



About the Project


The Integrated Development through Innovative Approach (IDIA) program is aligned with United Way Delhi's School Centered Community Development (SCCD) program. The program envisages a school environment that is conducive to learning which requires investments at multiple levels. Under the program, it is mandated to set up digital classrooms at 3 Government Middle Schools in project locations to supplement teaching through digital support. Youth Resource Centres (YRCs) function as key pillars to the program, ensuring a platform with a safe environment for learning. Through remedial classes, life skills and vocational trainings, digital and financial literacy, sports, arts and culture activities etc., the youth are engaged to freely enjoy, experience, learn, explore, grow and discover potentials, capacities and confidence, enabling them to make choices for their higher education, career paths and discover themselves.

Impact

- Five Anganwadi centers underwent upgrades to include child-friendly facilities like learning resources & workbooks, educational toys, a first-aid kit, a storage system, etc.
- Two capacity-building workshops on early childhood education were held for five Anganwadi workers, resulting in a 44% improvement in their overall knowledge levels as per the assessment.



- As per the FLN assessment, students at Composite School Maharajpur in grade 2 improved their learning level in Math from 35% to 65%, in English from 47% to 86%, and in Hindi from 42% to 82%.
- 71 % school teachers were able to use digital classroom effectively and lead classrooms sessions with students in three schools in Sahibabad location.
- WASH and ECO clubs were established in all three schools attributable in large part to project. These groups had 55 members in total and who remained as ideals among school students for environmental conservation.
- Learning assessment of academic remedial sessions held in Youth Resource Center showed that it improved from 19% to 44% in English, 34% to 49% in Science and 26% to 51% in Math.

Anish's Journey to Academic Excellence



About the Project

STEM ON WHEELS: United Way of Delhi is implementing a project STEM on Wheel, supported by AMD-XILINX INDIA TECHNOLOGY SERVICES PRIVATE LIMITED, across 20 schools in Sohna block in Gurugram district. Aligned to the National Education Policy 2020, United Way Delhi's STEM Education Program aims to promote STEM education among young minds and transform the learning environment with the upgradation of the infrastructure in the government school(s), setting up of STEM labs, etc. This initiative seeks to strengthen the education system by promoting STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) and experiential learning among students through a dedicated STEM on Wheels (equipped in a Van).

STEM: Promoting Equitable and Gender Responsive Education in STEM Pune, Maharashtra. United Way Delhi with the support of CAMS and implementation with CYDA took significant strides in developing STEM education in five government schools in Pune. Our efforts included conducting STEM activities both in-person and online, providing teacher's training, holding life skill sessions, and engaging with parents.

Two hundred students were given the chance to participate in the International Bebras Challenge; 106 of them completed it successfully, and five of them were recognized as National Winners.




STEM

Direct and Indirect Beneficiaries by Gender






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Gayatri Vishwakarma Sharma





Pre-post assessment of digital literacy training




JOVT

Program JOVT ensures Unlocking Potentials, Building, Careers

AIM of the Project: The Job Oriented Vocational Training program project aims to skill and train unemployed youth to provide them with livelihood support through employability access in the healthcare sector.

Benificiaries: Youth from low-income households were mobilized and targeted under this program to join the course for post-career guidance and counselling sessions. **Coverage:** It implements healthcare/soft skills and employability training in Vocational Centres across 13 states with the overall commitment to impart valuable skills to 6900 youth within a period of 2 years.

The Women Livelihood Program, supported by Brown-Forman, has been instrumental in transforming women's lives in the Sohna Block and has acted as a value edition to the ongoing programe. The support extension in the form of assets to women for initiating their entrepreneurial venture met two fold strategy of empowering women.


200 young people received ESDN training and were placed in the ESDN (Electronic System Design and Manufacturing) industry.

Impact Story

Overcoming Adversity: Pratibha's Journey from Financial Struggles to Aspiring Entrepreneur through the WE Lead Program

Pratibha, a member of the Unnati Self-Help Group, faced many challenges after an early marriage and financial struggles. Living in Delhi with her two young children, she couldn't pursue education or find stable work. Despite these obstacles, Pratibha started Saari Fall Pico work from home, earning 400-500 rupees monthly. Determined to improve her family's livelihood, she joined the WE Lead program to enhance her skills. Pratibha dreams of buying a stitching machine to increase her income. She is saving diligently through her SHG and plans to apply for a loan in six months, taking her first step towards independence.






About the Project

Project Samriddhi, initiated in 2016, empowers women from poor households in Delhi's Kapashera community. It provides digital financial and business knowledge, and personalized leadership support, and helps women start and grow businesses.

Impact

Over the five years, 3560 women benefited 1500 181 aspiring women started successful ventures. 1000 24 SHG group members out of 50 SHGs accessed inter-loaning to utilize funds for various 17 purposes. 500 13 exhibitions conducted in Delhi NCR where SHG members marketed 0 their products made from stitched **Direct Beneficiary** clothing.



Milan's Impact Story

Milan, a 28-year-old resident of Bihar, lived in a rented house in Kapashera with her husband and four children, facing numerous financial challenges. Her husband's monthly wage of Rs. 10,000 had to cover rent, utilities, tuition fees, and daily expenses, leaving little for savings. Milan, who previously earned Rs. 1,000-1,200 monthly from clothes alteration work, saw a dramatic change after joining a project initiative.

Through the project, she received a motorized sewing machine and underwent training in financial literacy, life skills, and gender awareness. Milan's income increased substantially, enabling her to save and open a recurring deposit account.

Today, Milan owns her own sewing machine, has a thriving tailoring business, and has bought a house in Salapur village. Her quality of life and skills have significantly improved. Her family is grateful to the SAMRIDDHI team for their support. Milan's journey from stitching clothes to owning her own house exemplifies the transformative power of opportunity and perseverance, demonstrating the profound impact of comprehensive empowerment initiatives.

About the Project

SVASTI

This project aims to improve the emotional and mental wellbeing of women in rural Sohna through expanding mental health services for vulnerable women in ten villages in Sohna block in Gugugram. Women from rural areas form a unique group due to the realities of rural living. The focused approach of the project lies on creating awareness and building capacity for early detection to prevent and treat mental health issues among women.

Rehabilitation and COVID 19

The project aimed to address concerns related to mental well-being, normalize its prevalence in the community, and equip participants with tools to create a safe, engaged, and productive environment. Modules for Community Health Workers and wellness were prepared to ensure healthcare availability and accessibility for all, particularly the most vulnerable and underprivileged.


School Mental Health Initiative

School Mental Health Initiative (SMHI) has been conceptualized with a focus on providing mental health services encompassing preventive and promotive measures for students of Grades 6 to 12. The project focuses on preventive, promotive, and therapeutic care using a holistic approach involving a range of stakeholders including the teachers, psychologists and the school administration.

Reach of Project

Installation of the Air Compressor System at the National Institute of Tuberculosis and Respiratory Diseases (NITRD) in New Delhi resulted in improvement at the health facilities.

340 community members were screened for TB through two health check-up camps.




Key Findings: Baseline vs Endline









Empowering Change: Sheetu Saxena and Ram Kala Sadan Trust



About the Project

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


